GENERAL OVERVIEW

The English Major with Credential Emphasis (EMCE) is a state-approved program that permits immediate entry into the Single Subject Credential Program by satisfying the required subject-matter competency requirements in English as specified by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC). The program includes courses in major authors, periods, genres, and language, as well as teaching practices and pedagogy.

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PROGRAM GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

LINGUISTICS

Linguistic Description: Students will be able to describe the grammar of English.

COMPOSITION

Writing Conventions: Students will be able to compose texts that conform to the conventions of a particular genre as well as the rules of standard written English.

Expository Writing: Students will be able to compose expository essays that demonstrate cohesion and clarity.

LITERATURE

Literary Analysis: Students will be able to analyze literary texts using evidence from the primary texts themselves.

Applying Critical Theory: Students will be able to apply specific critical approaches to literary works.

Researching Criticism: Students will be able to survey the existing criticism on any literary text.

Creative Writing: Students will be able to compose poetry, fiction, or drama.

PEDAGOGY

Theoretical Foundations: Students will be able to describe theoretical foundations essential to teaching and learning in the high school English Language Arts classroom.

Pedagogical Skills: Students will be able to assess pedagogical skills essential to teaching and learning in the high school English Language Arts classroom.

FRESHMAN APPLICATION CHECKLIST

When you're ready to begin your application to the CSU, be sure to have these items on hand:

Unofficial transcripts (both high school and college transcripts, if applicable): You'll be asked to enter all the
courses you've completed on your CSU application; those that are currently in progress; and any you plan to take.
Transcripts will be requested by campuses as needed.
Your Social Security number, if you have one.
Your citizenship status
Credit card or PayPal account: Application fees are due at time of submission.
Annual income: Your parents' if you are a dependent; your income if you are independent.
Educational Program, Work and Extracurricular Participation information: You will need to provide the
years you participated in college preparation programs and your average number of hours per week of work and/or
participation in extracurricular activities.
Information needed to apply to EOP (if applying): See the Apply to Educational Opportunity Program (EOP)
website for information about materials needed to complete the optional EOP application.
Test scores: Optional; if you have taken or plan to take the ACT, SAT, AP, IB exams, you may include the
information on the application. Reporting test scores is not required. SAT and ACT scores will not be used for
determining who gets admitted into the CSU. If you are accepted, the campus will use official test scores for
placement into mathematics and English courses.
California statewide student ID: Optional; every K-12 student in a California public school is assigned an ID
number. The number should be printed on your transcript.

TRANSFER STUDENT APPLICATION CHECKLIST

☐ Your parents' employment background and two recommendations: Applies only if you're applying to EOP.

ADVISING

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BA IN ENGLISH: ENGLISH MAJOR WITH CREDENTIAL EMPHASIS

The California Commission on Teacher Credentialling (CCTC) has authorized CSUB to offer a single-subject preparation program in English Language Arts for students who wish to teach in California secondary schools. To prepare prospective teachers according to the state-adopted English Language Arts Content Standards for California Public Schools and the Reading Language Arts Framework for California Public Schools, EMCE candidates must take all of the following requirements:

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS (38 UNITS)

First-Year Seminar (FYS); Lower Division Area A: Foundational Skills; Lower Division Area B: Natural Sciences; Lower Division Area C: Arts and Humanities; Lower Division Area D; Social and Behavioral Sciences; Lower Division Area E: Student Enrichment and Lifelong Learning (SELF)¹; Lower Division Area F: Ethnic Studies; American Institutions: Government and History; Junior Year Diversity & Reflection (JYRD); Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR)¹; Upper Division Thematic Area B and D; General Education Capstone¹.

¹ The SELF requirement may double count with B, C, or D. Students are waived from UDC area of their program. Capstone may be satisfied within the senior seminar.

MINORS

The English Department offers the following minors:

Minor in English Literature

The minimum requirements for a minor in English Literature are four (4) courses in English literature totaling 12 semester units, at the 2000 level or above, at least three of which must be upper division. Courses that satisfy the GWAR, or courses in Linguistics or Children's Literature, do not count towards the minor in English Literature.

Minor in Linguistics

The minor in Linguistics is especially useful for elementary and secondary teachers and for those interested in English as a Second Language (ESL) instruction. It consists of four three-unit courses: ENGL 3610 and three additional upper-division linguistics courses from the following: ENGL 3640, ENGL 3650, ENGL 4648, ENGL 4650.

Minor in Children's Literature

The minor in Children's Literature indicates the completion of specialized study in children's and young adult literature. The following four courses totaling 12 semester units are required: ENGL 4410, ENGL 4420, ENGL 4430, and ENGL 4440.

FINISHING THE EMCE PROGRAM

APPLYING FOR GRADUATION

All students must apply online for graduation, which will initiate the graduation evaluation process. As an undergraduate student, once you have completed 84 semester units, a link to apply online for graduation will be available on your MyCSUB Student Center. In addition, you will receive an email notification that you may be eligible to apply for graduation.

Before applying for graduation, you should review your academic requirements with your academic advisor. You should confirm that you are within two semesters of completing all remaining graduation requirements.

The Single Subject Credential Program, offered through the Teacher Education Department, prepares candidates to teach in a specific subject in departmentalized classes as generally found in middle schools and high schools, such as seen in grades 6-12.

CSUB's teacher credentialing preparation programs are accredited by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) and are a member in good standing of the Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation (AAQEP), a national accrediting organization recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation. STUDENT ACTIVITIES

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

English Club: Students majoring or minoring in English are welcome to meet in an informal setting to discuss literature, language, classes, and all other aspects of campus life. Meetings are generally held every other Friday afternoon.

Sigma Tau Delta: The English Department is home to the Xi Tau Chapter of Sigma Tau Delta, an international honor society for English majors and minors. Juniors, seniors, and graduate students are encouraged to apply.

PUBLICATIONS

Calliope: Calliope is an academic journal produced annually that publishes literary criticism, scholarship, and book reviews written by students at CSUB. The editorial team is faculty advised but composed of students, who learn publishing practices and oversee every step of review, layout, and production.

Orpheus: Orpheus is a literary journal published annually to encourage creative writing and artistic thinking among the students of CSUB. The editorial team is faculty advised, but composed of a student body, which oversees every step of production.

HONORS AND AWARDS

Sigma Tau Delta Creative Writing Awards: The Sigma Tau Delta Creative Writing Awards are presented annually to honor the creative work of CSUB students.

The Li'i Pearl Outstanding Student in English Award: The Pearl Prize honors a student who has made a special contribution to the department, the school, the university, and/or the community at large and who serves as a "proud representative" of the department.

EVENTS

The California Writers Series: Each year the English Department sponsors two or more readings by poets and fiction writers living and working in California.

The Lectures in Language and Linguistics: The L3 series aims to bring a California-based linguist and/or language expert to CSUB's campus every semester to speak on a given topic and meet with students and faculty.
