Essay Contest Guidelines

Please carefully read and follow the submission guidelines below:

- To be eligible, you must be a matriculated student in a First-Year Experience, First-Year Composition, or First-Year Ethnic Studies class at Bakersfield College; California State University, Bakersfield; Cerro Coso College; Porterville College; or Taft College.
- By entering the contest, you affirm that the essay submission is <u>your own original</u> <u>creation</u>.
- All entries must be written <u>without consultation with others</u>. This includes, but is not limited to, no consultation with family members, friends, peer response groups, tutoring centers, or writing centers.
- A written essay is the only literary form accepted (no poems, plays, songs, etc.).
- Only <u>one</u> essay may be submitted by <u>each contestant</u>.
- Each essay should reflect the contestant's own interpretation and original thinking.

Essay Specifications:

- The essay should be between 500 and 1000 words long, typed, double-spaced, using 12-point font (preferably Times New Roman or Arial).
- Each essay should include an original title.
- Your essay itself should <u>not</u> include your name or any other identifiers.
- Use 1-inch margins all around.

- Do not justify the right margin.
- Pages should be sequentially numbered.
- Use MLA-style documentation when quoting from the book.

Essays will be judged on the following criteria:

- Creativity Does the essay reflect a creative and original perspective on the book?
- Organization Does the argument follow a logical and easily understood progression?
- Clarity Does the author use concise language?
- Unity/Development of thought Does the essay reflect a thorough comprehension of the book?
- Grammar/Mechanics Does the contestant use correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation?

Essays will be judged by a committee of college instructors. Contest winners will be announced immediately before the author's keynote speech on Thursday, October 24, 2024.

Submitting Your Essay:

Entries must be received electronically by Dr. Emerson Case by <u>5 p.m. on Friday</u>, <u>October 11, 2024</u> at the following email:

When submitting, please <u>attach</u> an electronic version of your essay (preferably in Word format) to your email. The essay itself should contain no identifying information.

Then, include the following information <u>in the body of your email message</u>:

- Your name
- Email address
- Phone number
- College or University attending
- Course name/number for which the essay was written
- Name of the instructor of the course
- Title of your essay
